### INSIDE THIS REPORT

The Annual Arts in Schools Report is a new tool for school leaders to understand their delivery of arts education to every child in their school. Each Annual Arts in Schools Report measures two areas:

#### Student Access to and Participation in Arts Education

Uses surveys and information from DOE databases to understand if students are meeting the New York State Instructional Requirements for the Arts. In addition, this section reports on questions asked in the Learning Environment Surveys about arts education.

#### Resources to Support Arts Education

Uses information from DOE databases and surveys to understand the resources that schools are allocating for arts education. This section includes information on certified arts teachers, arts and cultural organization services, space for arts learning, arts fundraising, and professional development opportunities for teachers.

### STUDENT ACCESS TO AND PARTICIPATION IN ARTS EDUCATION

At the middle school level, in grades 7 and 8, the New York State Education Department (NYSED) expects that students achieve, by the end of grade 8, one half-unit of study in visual arts and one half-unit of study in music. New York City has filed a formal request to the NYSED to allow schools to offer any two of the four arts disciplines to fulfill the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade requirement.

#### School Progress in Meeting New York State Education Department Requirements

The table below shows if 6<sup>th</sup> graders received instruction in dance, music, theater and/or visual arts and the percent of 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade students participating in arts classes in 2006-2007:
